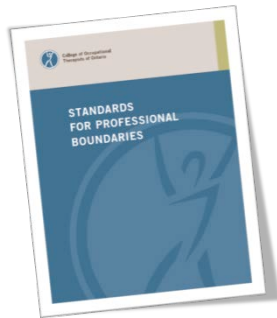

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“The relationship between the OT and client in the context of providing care” (COTO)



Professional Boundary:

“the implicit or explicit demarcation separating the professional relationship with a client from one that is personal” (COTO)



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Boundary Crossing:

- A behaviour in a relationship that **may compromise** the therapeutic relationship with the client.
- Can involve an **intentional** excursion over the line with a **return** to established limits.



Boundary Violation:

When the nature of the therapeutic relationship moves from a professional one to also being personal and non-therapeutic, such that harm or the potential for harm can come to the client.



Recognizing Professional Boundary Issues

Understand:

- types of **violations**
- practice **context risks**
- the **power** imbalance



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Recognizing Professional Boundary Issues

Personal and **professional** risk factors:

- own physical/mental health
- personal stressors
- social/professional isolation
- knowledge about boundaries
- loneliness



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Recognizing Professional Boundary Issues

Recognize:

- Personal beliefs, opinions, or values
- Situations of direct/indirect benefit for the OT
- If others could perceive an issue.



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Recognizing Professional Boundary Issues

Monitor:

- Client **behaviours**
- **Changes** in the therapeutic relationship
- **Own** actions



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Warning Signs

- ✓ **Selecting** clients based on certain features
- ✓ Providing **increased attention**
- ✓ **Disclosing** your personal information
- ✓ Being **preoccupied** with a client
- ✓ Looking forward to **physical** contact
- ✓ **Dressing** differently
- ✓ Experiencing discomfort or **defensiveness**
- ✓ Receiving **feedback** from others



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Preventing Professional Boundary Issues

- Not allowing **personal** beliefs to impact relationship
- Building **cultural** awareness
- Developing **policies**
- Avoiding activities that **compromise** objectivity
- **Establishing** and **communicating** boundaries
- Modifying/setting up the practice **environment**
- Not **touching** a client in a non-therapeutic manner.

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Preventing Professional Boundary Issues

- Avoiding entering into dual relationships such as:
 - with those the OT has a personal relationship with
 - non-therapeutic relationships with *current* clients
 - non-therapeutic relationships with *former* clients



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Preventing Professional Boundary Issues

- Avoiding **special** or **discriminatory** treatment
 - special exceptions
 - billing irregularities
 - disclosure of personal information
 - exchange of gifts
 - activities not part of therapeutic relationship



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Preventing Professional Boundary Issues

- Addressing:
 - own emotional reactions to a client
 - indicators that signal a boundary crossing or violation
- Not exploiting OT status for personal gain
- Providing clients with information on alternate options.



Managing Professional Boundary Issues

- Seek assistance
- Discuss concerns with clients and re-establish boundaries.
- Accept responsibility



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Managing Professional Boundary Issues



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When unavoidable:

- ✓ Clarify roles
- ✓ Set boundaries
- ✓ Obtain and revisit consent
- ✓ Document



Managing Professional Boundary Issues

- End relationship and arrange alternate care
- Follow Duty to Report requirements

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Bylaws

Section 68: Professional misconduct:

- (k) **falsifying** a record relating to the registrant's practice
- (l) signing or issuing in the registrant's professional capacity, a document that the registrant knows contains a **false or misleading statement**
- (m) **submitting an account or charge** for services that the registrant knows is false or misleading
